Dragonflies "Attend" WWII Commemoration by Juanita Carroll

February 19, 2012 marked the 70th anniversary of the Japanese bombing of Darwin back in 1942. My hubby was a toddler at the time and he with his mother and siblings were evacuated along with other women and children on December 22, 1941, prior to this event. We have visited Darwin on just a few occasions in the past two years and decided to return again to attend the services for the commemoration.



While attending the ceremonies in the parkland above the harbor, we noticed many dragonflies darting across the large screen that had been erected for

easy viewing of the ceremonies. Their appearance struck a chord with us, especially with this being a memorial service for those who had lost their lives on that fateful day.

However, sometime later when returning to our hotel we became aware of a large dragonfly hovering near my shoulder. We were on an elevated walkway where we needed to enter a lift, to descend five stories to the ground level parkland beside the harbor foreshore.

By the time we reached the lift, the dragonfly had settled on the sleeve of my blouse. So with bated breath we entered the lift, and took the ride to the ground, along with our new-found companion. Walking out of the lift, our dragonfly remained on my sleeve for another few minutes, before flying off into the sunlight. But, not before we took a photo of it...very special!

The amazing twist is that when sharing our evening meal with local friends, we commented on the presence of the dragonflies at the ceremony and were told "Impossible! It's the wet season and dragonflies don't appear until the dry! You never see dragonflies during the wet season!"... An interesting response! So glad we took the photo!

Adopt-a-State Update by Stan Liedman

The Adopt-a-State program continues to be an integral part of the Dragonfly Project. Through their work, our devoted volunteers have allowed the Dragonfly Project to reach many families who have lost loved ones living in many cities and states across the country. They watch the obituaries in newspapers from the area of their choice and distribute condolence cards containing a dragonfly key chain to grieving families. This year, our volunteers have sent cards to over 2,200 grieving families, which is about a 25% increase from last year at this time. The program continues to grow.

My wife Lynn and I have been coordinators for the Adopt-a-State program since it was established in 2009 with the first packets being shipped in February 2010. Since then, Adopt-a-State has continued to grow and allowed the Dragonfly Project to reach far and wide. We always welcome new volunteers as we know that despite our best efforts many families with tragic losses do not get packets since we do not cover all areas. Most of our volunteers are from families who have received packets. They realized the positive impact that the dragonfly message had on them and felt compelled to become part of the Dragonfly Project. That is also what led us to volunteer. We lost our daughter Michelle in March 2004 and received a packet. We first couldn't believe that somewhere there were loving people who cared about us and noticed our loss. We came to the annual celebration that first year and found comfort and love and wanted to help spread the message of hope. We love the experience of volunteering and would welcome anybody who would be interested.

Volunteering for the Adopt-a-State is a very easy volunteering opportunity and is something that makes one's heart feel close to those whom are grieving. We work with our new volunteers to find an area large or small for them to monitor. We help to identify newspapers for the area that they would cover. My Dragonfly Miracle by Lisa Grant

Our beautiful daughter, Tara, died tragically on June 24, 2007, at the age of 21. We received a dragonfly packet from a community friend who had lost her husband recently and it provided us with hope during a devastating time.

We had moved away from our community for a couple of years and returned in 2010 to be close to our daughter and grandson.

Shortly after we moved back, I was outside tending to my flowers and witnessed the largest dragonfly I have ever seen in my life. This miracle was so significant as this dragonfly held onto a pole near my flowers for an extended period of time, I quickly ran into the house and grabbed my phone to take pictures and when I returned the dragonfly was still there. It allowed me to get so close to take the pictures. Tara's favorite color was lime green. The sightings of dragonflies always bring me a feeling of hope and comfort and they are a sign to me that Tara is with me all of the time.

I have since sent many packets to those who are grieving the death of a loved one and am grateful for this project that brings a sense of hope, comfort and healing to so many. On an early December day in 2009, Pete and I met Annie for lunch. Pete had told me she was blind but I didn't know what to expect. I know I wasn't expecting so much joy, enthusiasm and generosity. I know I wasn't expecting Annie. I still find it hard to remember that she is blind. Her vision of God's grace is so clear and vibrant.



Annie's painting as it turned out was called, Luck Visits. It was something her grandmother had told her; that dragonflies are good luck. After her grandmother died, she was working with her grandmother's flowers and a dragonfly touched Annie's cheek as it flew by. Annie knew it was a reminder from her grandmother and God. The base coat for the painting contains bits of flower petals from her grandmother's flowers mixed with vibrant orange, a spirit color. And floating over it all is the dragonfly. Annie wrote to me, "For years the crook of my neck has cradled a dragonfly charm. My fingers would most certainly gravitate to the charm throughout any given day as a means to calm my nerves, focus my energy during prayer or a distracting device for anxious fingers. Needless to say, over time, I have come to know every detail of that charm." She was wearing that necklace, with the same charm as we use on our key chains, on her neck the day we met her.

Annie is a very generous person. Without hesitation she donated her artwork to The Dragonfly Project to use as we wished. So this year,



at our 10th Anniversary Celebration, we unveiled our newest card with Annie's precious painting on the front. Annie also shares The Dragonfly Project with others and often gives away a dragonfly key chain to people that she meets while out and about. She always carries an extra just in case.

Five months after the girls died, my husband and I were in Redwing, MN, climbing the bluffs after a Memorial Concert for the girls. This is something we did when camping there with our kids. When at the top of the bluff I started singing *The Hills are Alive with the Sound of Music* and began playfully running and spinning in circles. My girls and I would have done that in a cornball type of way, so I began to cry. All of a sudden not one or two, but exactly three dragonflies hovered over and danced around me! I knew my girls were enjoying that experience as much as me.



I have always sung and written songs and felt that one day I would make a CD. Well, that one day came and *Eternity Calls* was recorded

in 2007 as a special tribute and memorial to my girls. They all sing on it, as well as my son and daughter-in-law. I asked a friend take some photos for the artwork on the CD and we chose a beautiful place by a lake. It was June and I remember thinking, "What would make this perfect is if I saw some dragonflies." Well, a dragonfly actually landed on me as if to say, "Mom, I am so proud of you!" Now because of digital film, we must have had over a hundred pictures! I needed to come to a decision, so I asked a friend to look at them with me. As we were looking I saw something I hadn't seen in all dozens of times I had looked before. In one of the dancing photos, right above my head was not just one, or two, but three dragonflies! Now I knew that all three of my girls were cheering me on! I truly believe that God has given us the dragonfly, along with other beautiful creatures to remind us that life doesn't stop here!

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What is The Dragonfly Project?

In 2000, when I was 10 years old, our friends' 11-year-old son, Hans Bonde, died of a brain tumor. Shortly thereafter, I decided to send the family a story about dragonflies and their significance in the cycle of life and death. The story, written by Walter Dudley Cavert, ended with the comforting message: "The fact that we cannot see our loved ones or communicate with them after the transformation, which we call death, is no proof that they cease to exist."

This small gesture so moved the grieving family that, in 2002 at age 11, I decided to create my own nonprofit corporation that would reach out to people who were grieving. I decided to send people who had lost a loved one a condolence card, a copy of the dragonfly story and a dragonfly key chain. I incorporated the organization and named it "The Dragonfly Project."

Each year, thousands of dragonfly packets are sent throughout the United States and other countries to individuals who are grieving the loss of a loved one. Each dragonfly packet, which contains a condolence card, the dragonfly story and a dragonfly key chain, costs \$4.00 to make and send. The Dragonfly Project is operated by volunteers and a board of directors. Donations are welcome.
