The Dragonfly Project Through the Eyes of a Volunteer

I started volunteering for The Dragonfly Project in 2005. At the time my employer was looking for a volunteer opportunity that we could adopt on a company-wide basis. I worked for a small company—only 10 employees. Our involvement began by doing administrative things such as creating forms and having packet-making parties where we assembled keychains.

I have since retired from the company but I continue to volunteer for The Dragonfly Project. I like it because it fits my lifestyle. I can do my volunteer work at home on my schedule. I typically work 2-4 hours a week on tasks related to The Dragonfly Project.


I am involved in the Adopt-a-State program where I search the online newspapers in Montana, my birth state, looking for obituaries of individuals 40-years old or younger. The tricky part is locating an address for the survivors. As more people abandon their landlines in favor of cell phones, it is becoming more difficult to find an address for the survivors because I use whitepages.com or 411.com to find them. Since cell phones are not associated with a physical address, they are not listed on those websites.

The process is becoming more challenging as online newspapers are requiring paid subscriptions in order to view the full obituary or any article, for that matter. I'm getting pretty good at finding ways to research the deceased and find survivors, however. Another recent challenge occurred when my bookmark for the list of Montana newspapers changed. Instead of the list I've always used, I was redirected to several sites that are used in ancestry research. I'm sure those sites are very useful for that type of research but I don't know who I'm looking for so that makes it especially difficult. It has taken some creativity to find a list of the newspapers again and get back on task.

I am also in charge of taking the completed condolence card packets to the post office. The volunteers send their addressed and signed condolence cards to Julie & Pete Bonde where a key chain is put together and

affixed to the cards and the envelopes are sealed in a packet party event coordinated by Julie. When Pete & Julie have accumulated at least 200 complete packets, the minimum required by the post office for bulk mailing, they contact me to pick up the packets and make a bulk mail run. The Dragonfly Project has a non-profit bulk mail permit that allows the organization to take advantage of reduced postage through bulk mailing. The condolence card and key chain are mailed months after the obituary appears in the paper—well after the immediate out-pouring of sympathy.

I have received hand-written thank you notes from survivors. I even received a couple Facebook posts asking if I'd sent a condolence card and key chain but those are just icing on the cake for me. I'm very happy to be part of an organization that brings a message of hope to grieving families. The heartbreak for me comes when I am unable to locate an address for a survivor so the sting of a premature death can be momentarily relieved. This is a very worthy organization and I'm honored to do my part in support of its mission.

By this time all of the sympathy cards had disappeared from our mailbox, and life was moving on for everyone but my husband, Alex's two sisters and myself.

I read the dragonfly card and was so moved that I knew I had to try to get involved with this organization. I saw that on their website you could "Adopt-a-State." I contacted them and was given the state of North Dakota. As I went through the obituaries for this state I soon realized I was not alone in my sadness or the journey of grief I was given. I had such empathy for the parents who lost their child that it made me want to help more. So I contacted Stan Liedman and asked if I could have more states, I was then given Nebraska and Kansas. As I go through the obituaries now I feel that the people that I am able to locate are the ones that are in most need of receiving the beautiful dragonfly poem. I feel as though Alex is telling the newly departed young people that they don't need to worry because his Mom is going to find the family member that needs the message of hope.

I am so moved by this dragonfly journey I am on. I have just recently taken on the responsibility of yet another state, Oklahoma.

The Dragonfly cards, I feel, are a gift from my son to help move through the most difficult loss I have been given in this life. I feel Alex's spirit is with me each day when I sit and find more people to touch with this wonderful gesture of love and hope. Each week I send out a minimum of 32 cards. Each card I send is sent with the support of someone who shares a place in a new angel's heart."


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What is The Dragonfly Project?

In 2000, when I was 10 years old, our friends' 11-year-old son, Hans Bonde, died of a brain tumor. Shortly thereafter, I decided to send the family a story about dragonflies and their significance in the cycle of life and death. The story, written by Walter Dudley Cavert, ended with the comforting message: "The fact that we cannot see our loved ones or communicate with them after the transformation, which we call death, is no proof that they cease to exist."

This small gesture so moved the grieving family that, in 2002 at age 11, I decided to create my own nonprofit corporation that would reach out to people who were grieving. I decided to send people who had lost a loved one a condolence card, a copy of the dragonfly story and a dragonfly key chain. I incorporated the organization and named it "The Dragonfly Project."

Each year, thousands of dragonfly packets are sent throughout the United States and other countries to individuals who are grieving the loss of a loved one. Each dragonfly packet, which contains a condolence card, the dragonfly story and a dragonfly key chain, costs \$4.00 to make and send. The Dragonfly Project is operated by volunteers and a board of directors. Donations are welcome.
