My Gentle Giant, My Son

Kind, funny, loving and generous with a heart of gold is how I would describe my son Aaron. He was truly a gift from God because at the age of 33, I was told that I would never have children and was blessed with two beautiful children, Aaron and Ashley.

Aaron was a great role model for his sister Ashley. He was quick to show her how to do things, and he protected her. He was my confidant, friend and biggest supporter. Aaron had a great love for children, and they loved him in return. We often talked about him having his own children someday in the future. Everyone who came in contact with him remembered his beautiful trademark smile that he readily displayed. It was infectious.

There were so many hopes and dreams that we shared as a family but on May 8th, 2007, those dreams were shattered into millions of pieces when Aaron was tragically killed, just 23-years-old with his whole life ahead of him. This was the darkest day of my life. I felt like my whole world was at a standstill and slowly collapsing around me. A huge piece

of my heart had been snatched out leaving a gaping hole that could never again be filled. One day rolled into another and I was consumed with grief, sadness and anger. I just couldn't understand why this had to happen to my child. I'm sure that many of you have asked this same question. How would I ever get past this devastating blow to my life? I would never again hear him call me mommy, listen for his keys in the door or check for his jacket on the stair post leading to his room. How will I go on? How would I be able to face tomorrow? This was not easy, in fact it was the hardest thing that I have ever had to do in my life.

I give thanks for my unshakeable faith in God, my family and friends that quickly rallied around me, and a very special little

2019 Business Update

The Dragonfly Project (TDP) is now 18 years old. Since we started in 2002, we have sent out over 118,000 dragonfly packets, each representing an individual or family touched by our mission. In 2019, we sent out over 9,000 packets. More than half of these went through our online store, and almost a third of these were sent from obituaries taken from newspapers by our volunteers as part of the Adopt-a-State program. Our Adopt-a-State volunteers grew from 41 to 57 in 2019. The number of states impacted by this program increased from 35 to 39. We sent out 430 packets and 240 Dragonfly Door books to 6 different schools, as part of our School Outreach program. In this type of outreach, we send out packets to families and staff after the loss of a student, and provide copies of *The Dragonfly Door* book. We gave an additional 269 books as part of our *Dragonfly Door* outreach. This included 80 books distributed to Acoustics for Angels, an event in South Dakota that focuses on supporting those who have lost newborns. We also sent 29 books to the Twin Cities' chapters of The Compassionate Friends, a national organization that supports families experiencing the death of a son or a daughter, a brother or a sister, or a grandchild.

Financially, The Dragonfly Project continues to do well. Our Gross Profit was around \$59,000, a 4% decrease from the previous year. Our expenses remained about the same at about \$37,500. Our Net Income was approximately \$21,500, a 3% increase from 2018.

Executive Director's Corner: *Expanding our Outreach*

The Dragonfly Project's mission is to provide a message of hope to those who are grieving. Initially, we provided that hope by sending out the dragonfly story by Walter Dudley Cavert and a dragonfly keychain. This has continued to be our basic mode of outreach. Over the years, we developed other ways to provide that hope. More recently, we have put words and order to those forms of outreach. Here are our five programs in order of priority to provide that message of hope:

1. **Packet Program** - Send out and provide packets with the dragonfly story and a dragonfly keychain
2. **Newsletter Program** – Send out a biannual newsletter with stories of hope
3. **Packet Event Program** – Gather groups together to learn about The Dragonfly Project and have them volunteer to assemble packets (the dragonfly story card and keychain)
4. **Books and Music Program** – Provide *The Dragonfly Door* to schools and organizations where it is used to help children understand the loss of a loved one and the grief that follows. This program also includes a music CD with the reading of the dragonfly story and a special Dragonfly Moments song.
5. **Annual Celebration Program** – A gathering of recipients and volunteers who share stories of how The Dragonfly Project has impacted their life and brought a message of hope, along with a candlelight ceremony and montage, remembering those they've lost. A short reception follows.

This year The Dragonfly Project will be focusing on reaching out to more people through our Packet and Newsletter Programs. We plan to recruit more Adopt-a-State volunteers who find addresses of people who have lost a loved one by researching obituaries throughout the United States. We are also investigating the possibility of expanding this program to include other countries. We are also investigating other ways we may share packets with other organizations with similar missions to ours.



Our Newsletter Program will be expanding as we start to send out our newsletter via email. This will add a few hundred more people to our outreach. A hard and emotional discussion led to our cancelling our annual celebration and remembrance event in March due to the coronavirus. bright yellow envelope that arrived at my church with a return address that read 'The Dragonfly Project.' I couldn't imagine what this could be or how someone even knew what Church I attended. When I got home, I went out to sit on my back steps so that I could feel the sun on my face. The sun always made me feel better and somehow brightened my spirit. I opened the card carefully and looked at the beautiful dragonfly pictured on the front. I began to read it, holding on to each word in each line of the card. Tears slowly began to run down my face. At that very moment I began to realize that even though I could no longer see, hear or touch Aaron in his familiar physical state, it didn't mean that he was no longer in my presence. My spirit began to lift as I reflected on those beautiful words over and over again.

The feeling that I got after reading the dragonfly card is unexplainable. Every time I talked to someone, I found myself telling them about the beautiful card that a Dragonfly Project volunteer had taken the time to send me. My loss was shared by someone that I didn't even know. I'll never forget the peace of mind that this tiny card brought me. These were feelings that I hoped everyone who had lost someone and was grieving should be able to experience.

That day I knew that I had to become a part of the Dragonfly Project volunteer program. I had to help spread that news to other individuals grieving. The next week I was able to meet with a local volunteer and began volunteering the very next month. To date, I have been working as a volunteer for 13 years! I have also been able to persuade a friend, Shirley Gilliam, to become a faithful volunteer. 2019 Business Update continued

HERE ARE SOME OTHER HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2019:

- Nativity Lutheran Church and its members were involved in six packet events where volunteers assembled 2,325 packets. Nativity supports The Dragonfly Project in many ways including lending space for events and board meetings, and promoting our mission.
- Thrivent Financial and its members were involved in six events where they assembled 1,287 packets and many extra keychains. Thrivent Financial is our #1 financial supporter through their many different programs.
- The Dragonfly Project is working on forming a relationship with The Compassionate Friends organization. We visited its three chapters in the Twin Cities and provided them with packets and *The Dragonfly Door* books.
- The Dragonfly Project is now doing payroll! Pete Bonde is our first official employee for The Dragonfly Project. He works part-time as Executive Director, computer support and grant support.
- The Dragonfly Project collaborated with the National Funeral Directors Association on a project to create a Remembering A Life Self-Care Box. The dragonfly story with a dragonfly keychain is one of eight items in a box to help provide comfort for a family during a difficult time of grieving after the death of a loved one.
- We welcomed Janell Stanton Soderberg as a new Dragonfly Project board member. Janell came to us with a wealth of experience, including her work in the legal field.
- Julie and Pete Bonde went to Hastings MN and participated in a 'Grief Chat' radio talk show on KDWA. We shared our personal story and told the Dragonfly Project story. We also gave suggestions for how to help those in grief to make it through the holidays.

What is The Dragonfly Project?

The Dragonfly Project is a registered 501(c)(3) non-profit that sends condolence cards carrying a message of hope to people who are grieving. Our organization consists of volunteers who look up names in obituaries and help put together and mail packets to people who are grieving; usually 3 to 6 months after the death has occurred. Each packet contains a condolence card, a copy of the dragonfly story printed on the inside cover and a dragonfly keychain.

Each year, thousands of dragonfly packets are sent throughout the United States and other countries to individuals who are grieving the loss of a loved one. Each dragonfly packet costs \$4.00 to make. The Dragonfly Project is operated by volunteers and a board of directors. Donations are welcome. Your donations are tax deductible.

OUR BEGINNINGS

In 2000, when 11-year-old, Hans Bonde, died from a brain tumor, Anne Marquardt Brooker and her mother sent his family a story about dragonflies and their significance in the cycle of life and death (written by Walter Dudley Cavert). The small gesture so moved the grieving family with its "message of hope" that it inspired Anne to create a nonprofit corporation that would reach out to others who were grieving the loss of a family member or friend. In 2002, when Anne was 11, she founded The Dragonfly Project to share this message of hope with others.

HOW CAN I GET A PACKET TO SEND TO SOMEONE?

To get a packet sent to you, please go to our website store (dragonflyproject.org/online-store) and order a card to be shipped to you. Then you can sign and send the card to whomever you wish. The cards in our store have room for you to insert your own message. Please allow 2 to 3 weeks to receive your order. It is never too late to tell someone you care about their loss.
