Hello! It has been a wonderful and exciting few months for the Dragonfly Project. There have been many opportunities to spread the hopeful message of the dragonfly story. I have given several speeches to various groups including a Kiwanis club in northeast Minneapolis, the Bloomington-Richfield Grief Support Coalition, and Partnership Resources, Inc., in St. Louis Park.

I also have had the opportunity to participate in some very neat events, such as the Seventeen magazine photo shoot in New York City and a video recording session locally at Jamesland Studios (www.jamesland.com) in Maple Grove. IN MEMORY OF CADEN FAIR

Dear Anne,

My husband and I received a dragonfly packet from you last week in the mail. Our son, Caden, passed away in early August at the age of 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ months due to a rare chromosomal defect known as Trisomy 22. Caden was our first child. I never understood how you could move on after such a loss but you do. It is through the support you receive, many times from people you don't even know, that pulls you through. We are so grateful to have had Caden here with us and would do it all over again to have the 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ wonderful months we had with him. We have turned what could have been a very negative experience into a positive experience and only hope that when we are able to, we can give back to other parents who suffer the loss of a child.

When my husband and I watched the Eleven Who Care this year it was very emotional. Dayle and Bruce Schnack (who were also Eleven Who Care awards recipients) donated their time to photograph our family the week before Caden passedjust over a month before the show aired. I am not sure how we could ever tell them what their generosity has meant to our family. Little did we know how much your story would also move us and that on one of those days when we were missing Caden so very much I would open up the mail box to find the dragonfly. I also cannot tell you how much your kind action has meant to us. Thank you. You are an amazing young person with an amazing heart. I can only begin to imagine how far you are going to go in life. It meant so much to us to receive the dragonfly story as we believe Caden has transitioned and is looking down on us.

IN MEMORY OF RACHEL SCHREINER

Dear Anne,

We continue to mourn the death of our daughter, Rachel, on June 13, 2005, after a nine year battle with breast cancer. We praise God that Rachel got to know your Mom and you in the years before her death. The legend of the Dragonfly was a source of strength and hope for her especially in her last days. She lived - and died - in the faith that there is more to life than we can see with our eyes, that we never really "lose" a loved one; they are waiting for us to join them in eternal life.

Soon after Rachel's death, we joined a grief support group sponsored by Mercy Hospital, Coon Rapids, MN. We quickly noticed that several group members were wearing dragonfly pins. We learned that you had visited the support groups at Mercy almost two years ago and shared the legend of the dragonfly. The story became a source of comfort and hope for many of your listeners. They witnessed to that hope by wearing the dragonfly pins.

The dragonfly symbol has become a way for grieving people to identify each other and offer each other support. It reminds us that we are not alone in our grief. Others have walked this way before. They are ready to walk with us down that painful path. It also reminds us that there are other grieving people out there who need our help and support. We need to look beyond ourselves and our grief and share the strength and hope that God has given us.

Thanks, Anne, for introducing Rachel and us to the legend and symbol of the dragonfly.

HEATHER CUMMINGS

In 2002, I was finishing my final year of graduate school for Speech-Language Pathology at the U of MN. I had anxiously been awaiting my final placement, a hospital setting. I was placed at Mercy Hospital in Coon Rapids, MN. My new clinical supervisor was an angel sent straight from heaven, her name was Valerie Marquardt.. We connected immediately in many ways. We spent nearly 10 weeks together. During those weeks we learned a lot about one another. We discovered shortly that my home town of Pine City was right next to her husband Greg's hometown of Rush City. We then found out that my aunt Candy was Valerie's mother-in-law's hair stylist. We happened to have many unique connections that seemed to have a magical way of surfacing.

Valerie spoke often of her daughter Anne, and told me about this wonderful nonprofit organization she had started. I remember thinking she was an amazing 11 year old! The organization was of course The Dragonfly Project, which at that time was in the beginning stages of development. During my time at Mercy Hospital with Valerie, a high

school friends' brother, Patrick Bombard, died in a terrible accident. My friend Brad lived in California at the time, and I had not seen him in over five years. I wanted to do something for him and his family, as many of us do during times like these. But I was not sure what I should or even could do. Valerie offered to have Anne send both Brad and his family, the Bombards, dragonfly packets. Those were the first packets I ever sent out. I never knew the kind of impact that simple act of empathy could invoke. The dragonfly poem and symbolism ended up making a big difference in that family's life. This past year the Bombard family was on the news spotlighting The Dragonfly Project and telling their special stories related to the project.

I have sent out many packets to friends and family over the past three years. I have always received gracious feedback from those that have been touched by the comforting poem, keychain, and card. Then on June 3, 2005, I for the first time found out what it felt like to be on the receiving end. My dad, Gary Cummings, was killed in a tragic accident at work. He was 57 years old. I had spoke with him the day before, making plans for the summer—BBQ's, birthday celebrations, and weekend trips to Pine City. My world stopped in an instant.

Although I had read the dragonfly poem at least 30 times before, when I received my personalized packet from Valerie, Anne, and Greg, it felt like it was the first time I had ever read it. I never dreamed that I would be receiving one...so soon in my eyes.

This Fall I donated a memorial on behalf of my dad because of my love for him and I do not want to see the chain end. I wanted to contribute to this great cause. I knew my dad would be so proud, looking down, knowing I had donated to such a wonderful cause in his name.

I wish that every single person who loses someone they love could have the opportunity to receive a dragonfly packet. During the darkest moments of grief, when nothing else seems to help, it is a blessing from heaven that this story can ease the pain. I believe that my personal dragonfly has buzzed full circle. What started out as me giving this story to others has turned in to those same people giving it back to me. This summer at a birthday celebration the Bombard family gave my brother, sister, and I some very special gifts. I received a stain glass dragonfly to hang in my window, a dragonfly card, and a big hug. How powerful!

The human act of pure kindness and compassion for others is the best gift anyone can give or receive. The Dragonfly Project is just that. It is a warm and comforting blessing. I know that it has changed my life and thousands of others. I thank The Dragonfly Project from the bottom of my heart. I thank Anne and her parents. I especially thank Valerie for bringing this into my life. I plan on staying involved for a very long time.

What is The Dragonfly Project?

In 2000, when I was 10 years old, our friends' 11-year-old son, Hans Bonde, died of a brain tumor. Shortly thereafter, I decided to send the family a story about dragonflies and their significance in the cycle of life and death. The story, written by Walter Cavert, ended with the comforting message: "The fact that we cannot see our loved ones or communicate with them after the transformation, which we call death, is no proof that they cease to exist."

This small gesture so moved the grieving family that, in 2001 at age 11, I decided to create my own nonprofit corporation that would reach out to people who were grieving. I decided to send people who had lost a loved one a condolence card, a copy of the dragonfly story and a dragonfly key chain. I incorporated the organization and named it "The Dragonfly Project."
